VI. Read the following passage carefully and answer the questions which follow:

Are you hungry? Would you like a steaming hot, home-cooked meal for lunch? Impossible? Not at all, if you are in Mumbai. Every day, an army of nearly five thousand *dabbawalas* collects and delivers 1,75,000 to 2,00,000 lunch packages within hours by means of a unique, simple and highly efficient system which is 125 years old. They will deliver your meal at your desk at 12.30 p.m. on the dot, served hot, of course.

After the customer leaves home, the lunch is packed into a tiffin box. A colour coded notation on the handle identifies its owner and destination. Once the *dabbawala* has picked up the tiffin, he moves fast using a combination of bicycles, trains and his two feet. The entire system depends on teamwork and meticulous timing. Tiffin boxes are collected from homes between 7 and 9 a.m. and taken to the nearest railway station. At various stations they are hauled onto platforms and sorted out for area-wise distribution. The charge for this extraordinary service is a nominal Rs. 150 to 300 per month.

The brilliance of the system lies in its simplicity. The *dabbawalas* have their own unique system of sorting which is colour - coded. Mistakes are rare - may be one in about eight million deliveries.

Their impressive performance has made the *dabbawalas* the subject of study in many business schools in India and abroad, where they have been invited to give guest lectures. The BBC has produced a documentary on them, and Prince Charles, during his visit to India, visited them and he had to fit in with their schedule, since their timing is too precise to permit any flexibility. Most remarkably in the eyes of the Westerners the success of the *dabbawala* trade has involved no advanced technology. What makes the system even more admirable is the fact that the average *dabbawala* is semi-literate, sometimes having studied only up to class 7. The system accommodates those who didn't or couldn't finish their studies.

Apart from commitment and dedication, each *dabbawala*, like any other businessman had to bring some capital with him. The minimum investment is two bicycles (approximately Rs. 4,000), a wooden crate for the tiffin-boxes (Rs. 500), at least one white cotton kurta-pyjama (Rs. 600), and Rs. 20 for the trademark Gandhi *topi*. The next time you are in Mumbai, look out for the *dabbawalas*. If you are interested, you will find them only too willing to share their experiences with you.
